
#### **Student Excellence**








#### Y11 TUTOR GROUP TAKEOVER

excellent achievement.



# YEAR 8 - TRANSLATION BEE 2022-2023

This Autumn term, all year 8 pupils taking part in the Routes into Languages translation bee competition in either French or German. The competition involves pupils learning kev vocabulary and sentence starters so that they can translate a number of sentences from English to French German. December, pupils will



compete to see who can translate the highest number of sentences accurately and with good pronunciation, in a minute.

This competition develops pupils' pronunciation, sentence building and memory skills and is a great support to pupils' core language knowledge. There will be two class winners from each year 8 class who will go through to the school round, and then a regional North East final and a national final in Cambridge.

#### A TASTE OF ENGLISH STUDIES

Studying critical theory as part of their course, the students were given opportunity to reflect on why a theoretical approach is important. #### **EUROPEAN DAY OF LANGUAGES**

European Day of Languages every 26<sup>th</sup> of September celebrates the wealth of languages and cultures that exist around the continent of Europe.

Throughout the day, teachers of all different subjects brought languages into their classroom by organising different activities. Year 7 English pupils celebrated by learning some Dari and eating Afghan inspired food, whilst sitting on a toshak (blanket). This allowed them to immerse themselves in the culture of their set text – The Breadwinner, by Deborah Ellis. In History, pupils were tasked with identifying ancient languages. Pupils enjoyed a feast of food from around the world at lunchtime, and all teachers were encouraged to use a different language for the day.

In Languages, pupils completed their piece our Language jigsaw by considering how they are linked different to languages in their everyday lives. We really looking forward to displaying this when we move into our new building, it truly demonstrates diversity the



Egglescliffe school, and that languages are all around us!

Pupils also learnt some basic Ukrainian phrases and Y7 and Y8 pupils began their spelling and translation Bee challenges! A huge



number of e-praise points were awarded to all pupils who took part in our Languages Treasure hunt around school during the day.

### SPOTLIGHT ON KS3 READING


#### **CHECK THEM OUT!**

A record number of books have been checked out of the library so far this term as part of our Spine Reading programme!

Students in KS3 follow a Reading Spine: a selection of texts chosen to engage and challenge. Each Reading Spine takes the students on a journey through genre and topic with books accessible to their current reading age.

Reading Spines are designed to act as a springboard to wider reading; staff take part in reading conversations and offer reading suggestions to students. Three morning registration sessions a fortnight focus on reading spine texts.

Students can access their spine texts via the library platform 'Reading Cloud'. Students can choose to submit reviews via the Reading Cloud platform in order to achieve reading e-Praise points.













## PASTORAL SUPPORT, ADVICE & GUIDANCE

During this fortnightly update, we are discussing the Help and Support provisions on offer within Stockton local authority. Below you shall see the outline of what support can be offered, but if you would like specific information about the services out there, please speak with the Help and Support local authority team or pastoral team within school who will be able to give more advice and guidance.

## WHAT IS HELP AND SUPPORT (PREVIOUSLY NAMED EARLY HELP)?

All children and young people will receive Universal Services, however, some children, either because of their needs or circumstances will require extra support to be healthy and safe and to achieve their potential.

Help and Support (previously named Early Help) may be needed at any point in a child or young person's life and support is required quickly to reduce the impact of problems that may have already emerged. Families are best supported by those who already work with them. Help and Support is a collaborative approach for children whose needs and circumstances make them more vulnerable, a coordinated multi-disciplinary approach is usually best, based on a Help and Support Assessment.

#### Our Help and Support services are here to help you with any concerns about your child or children, your family and your home circumstances.

We can offer support regarding:

- behaviour
- family relationships
- problems at school
- budgets or debt
- children's routines
- other difficulties you are experiencing

#### Support for the whole family

If one person in the family has a problem, this may be a child, young person or adult, it can affect the whole family.

We offer the following support to families:

#### **Family Solutions Team**

A team of Family Workers who work directly with families, children and young people to support them with single or multiple issues including:

- housing
- debt management
- behaviour and routines
- boundaries
- relationship difficulties
   Families can access this service by speaking to any professional they are working with, who can make a referral on your behalf.

#### **Family Group Conference**

A Family Group Conference (FGC) is a family-led meeting in which a child's wider family network comes together to plan future arrangements for the child. The family plan will ensure that the child is safe, and their wellbeing is promoted. FGCs utilise a family's own skills, strengths, and personal knowledge of their family situation to resolve difficulties.

We have a dedicated team to help and support professionals and families through the Early Help process, contact our team on <a href="mailto:schoolsupportadmin@stockton.gov.uk">schoolsupportadmin@stockton.gov.uk</a> or 01642 524188 or 01642 526123.

In addition, you can speak with the pastoral team in school (safeguarding leads and heads of year) if you would like further information about the Help and Support that is available within the local offer.

## COST OF LIVING SUPPORT HUB + WARM SPACES

Many households are struggling with the cost of living, including the steep rise in the price of their heating and energy bills. Individuals and families are facing tough decisions about whether and when they may be able to afford to heat their home.

To try and help our residents navigate this challenging time, Stockton-on-Tees Borough Council's <u>A Fairer Stockton-on-Tees</u> team is working with partner organisations to build a Warm Spaces directory. The Council has launched a 'Cost of Living Support Hub' that brings together resources in one place about welfare entitlement, energy advice, free school meals, council tax reduction, housing benefit, Universal Credit, food banks and more. It will evolve over the coming months to host vital information from partner organisations across the housing, health and VCSE sectors. Warm Spaces launches on Monday 3rd October with more than 50 venues pledging their support in principle. The Fairer Stockton-on-

Tees team, alongside partners like Catalyst, Thirteen, North Star Housing, Tees Active Leisure and others are building a directory of places where residents in need can go and get warm, take part in activities, receive support/advice, avoid social isolation, reduce their anxiety about their utility bills and generally stay as well as possible. 
### WHAT'S ON IN PSHE THIS FORTNIGHT?
