## YEAR 11 CHOOSE TO SUCCEED

This term we have launched our Trust revision site 'Choose to Succeed'. On this site our Year 11 students will be able to access English language and literature as well as maths resources to support their exam preparation. In the next few weeks this will be expanded to include languages, geography, history, computing and RE.

These revision sites should be a 'one stop shop' so our Year 11s can find all the resources they need in one place to make revising as easy as possible.

On this site they will find a revision list for the course, links to the specification, a countdown to the first GCSE exam, past papers, quizzes, knowledge organisers, video tutorials and much more.

There is also access to a general course which gives them hints and tips on how to revise, how to put together a revision plan and how to look after their well-being during this pressured time.

We know our Year 11s will find it really useful. If they haven't accessed it yet please click <a href="here">here</a>. Students can log on with their Office 365 account details. They will be asked for a self-enrolment key for each course-this is just their class group code which can be found on their timetable e.g 11E/Ma1. If they are not sure, then all they need to do is ask their teacher. Happy revising!

### **RUGBY SUCCESS AGAIN!**

Egglescliffe have recently reached 3 regional finals in Rugby league


The Under 16s played Whitley Bay High School after conceding an early try at the start of the game. Egglescliffe dominated possession for the majority of the first half but due to a strong Whitley bay defence and mistakes, they could not find a way through. To rub salt in the wound Whitley Bay scored a breakaway try from their own 20m line just before half time. In the second half Whitley were too strong as they had a host of academy players. They won 26-4.

The Year 9 team played John Spence in the play off semifinal having gone through as group as the number 1 seed from the south from previous competitions. They started the game really well going through their sets and going up 4 tries to 0. John Spence then replied with 2 consecutive tries but a strong finish the Year 9s won.

In the final against Whitburn the first half was a close contested affair with Egglescliffe going 2 tries to nil up at half term. At the start of the second half Egglescliffe played some great rugby running in five unanswered tries to be crowned North East Champions. They now go into the last 16 of England where they will play a team from Yorkshire. The best of luck to the Year 9s.

The year 8 team qualified for the final with wins over St Aidans, Parkview and Castle View. They met last year's winners Ponteland High school in the regional final. After a good start with Egglescliffe scoring in the first set, Ponteland came back into the game with some strong running and despite our defensive efforts they were too strong winning 26-12. That now means the school represents North East in the last 16 of England with a trip to Cumbria after half term.

#### **RELIGIOUS STUDIES DR. PETER VARDY CONFERENCE**

On the 24<sup>th</sup> of January 2023, a group of Year 10's attended an RS conference by Dr. Peter Vardy. The meeting spanned from 9:30 to 2:30 and was a great experience for everyone involved. The group was led by Mr. Macaulay and Mr Owen, who accompanied them to Our Lady and St. Bede's Catholic Secondary School in Stockton, where the event took place. Peter Vardy, the speaker, is an English philosopher who has written over 15 books on theology. He was the Vice-Principle of Heythrop College in London from 1999 – 2001 and served as President of the London Society for the Study of Religion.

In the first part of the conference, Dr. Vardy presented background facts and views on abortion, euthanasia, the advancement in genetic engineering and the future of humans and technology on earth. The audience took part in debates, and then shared answers with the rest of the room. This session was particularly interesting as it links to some of the topics for our GCSE qualification. Dr. Vardy outlined to us the viewpoints of Catholics, other Christians and atheists like Peter Singer. This also helped us to build our awareness of different arguments and how we can evaluate them in our exam essays; a universally valuable skill!

The final session was a lecture about human rights, animal rights and the rights of artificial intelligence. Dr. Vardy was an exceptionally intelligent and powerful speaker, with the ability to make us all step back and wonder about problems we had never even considered before. The biggest of these was artificial intelligence. When artificial intelligence becomes more intelligent than human beings, what place will we have to dominate over our own creation? If AI is conscious, should it have the same rights to freedom as human beings? What even is consciousness? Will all of our jobs become dominated by artificial intelligence? Are they simply the next level of evolution? Though these queries might feel like stories of science fiction, Dr. Vardy expressed that a new world of AI will be upon us soon, and it is up to philosophers and scientists to ponder our future.

One pupil left the day saying "I left this session totally enthralled- I had been utterly engaged by the level of depth Peter Vardy expressed - my brain ached!"

Overall, all of us felt we had something to gain from this conference, whether that was broadening our exam knowledge or just engaging ourselves in a university-style presentation. Peter Vardy has opened our minds: we are prepared to take on philosophy.

#### **General Information**

## **Young carers - Eastern Ravens Trust**


### "They estimate that in every classroom at least one child will identify as a young carer "

During the autumn term and beyond we have had the pleasure of Simon Honeywell (keyworker from Eastern Ravens Trust) coming in and visiting the school to educate students and staff about young carers. Young carers are children who look after a family member., however they do not have to be the sole carer; they can support another family member in caring for somebody. Their extra responsibilities often mean they can miss out on school and hanging out with their friends. These responsibilities mean that young carers may need extra support at school or to have respite outside of school and engage in activities alongside other young carers. Eastern Ravens Trust is our local service that can offer support for young carers and their families.
