BRINGING HISTORY TO LIFE: YEAR 9'S ENCOUNTER WITH A WWI SOLDIER

On Remembrance Day 2024, students from 9O and 9R participated in a unique workshop with the National Archives in London. The highlight of the session was meeting Private Henry Fairhurst, a soldier from a Pals Battalion, who was virtually "beamed" into the classroom straight from his trench near the Somme during the First World War.

In this experience, Private Fairhurst shared accounts of life in the trenches. Students learned about the challenges he faced, from the ever-present mud and relentless rain to the camaraderie that kept spirits alive. He also offered a glimpse into his personal journey, explaining how he joined the army alongside friends from his hometown as part of the Pals recruitment initiative.

Throughout the session, students were invited to interact with Private Fairhurst, asking questions that delved into his daily routine, his parents' reaction to his enlistment, and whether he found any meaningful positives in his service despite the harsh conditions. The discussions explored whether the trenches were truly just "mud and blood" or if moments of humanity and purpose could still shine through.

The workshop was not only a powerful way to learn more about the First World War but also a way for students to learn about the sacrifices of those in the past and the importance of Remembrance today.








BLOOD BROTHERS DRAMA TRIP

A LEVEL LONDON TRIP

On 19th and 20th November, a group of A Level English Literature, Language and Media students attended a residential trip to London. There were lots of opportunities for sightseeing, along with a production of Les Miserables and a tour of Shakespeare's Globe (for English students) and a film at the IMAX (for Media students).

Students were treated to a fantastic talk from David Stewart, F1 Race Mechanic for American team HAAS. David provided the students with an insight into a day in the lift of an F1 employee, dispelling many of the myths as he went. He discussed many different roles and suggested things students could do in order to improve their chances of entering the world of F1.

CUMMINS YOUNG ENGINEERING PROGRAMME

The second cohort of the Cummins Young Engineering Partnership was launched recently. Presently we have 20 year 9 students who have been part of the project for a year so far, and this will run for them until the end of year 11. They took part in various engineering activities throughout year 8, all contributing to their portfolio of evidence towards the Industrial Cadet accreditation. Cohort 1, current year 9s, attended their first activity of this year when they visited the Cummins plant in Darlington. The students were given a workshop floor tour and discovered the changing face of manufacturing in the UK, noticing the introduction of robotics on the assembly line and robot sleds replacing fork-lift truck drivers. Students then took part in an engine teardown, they got hands on in examining different parts of an engine, whilst stripping down parts and rebuilding others.

They will shortly be moving on to their next activity of the year when they head to Darlington College and begin programming robot arms similar to those that are on the assembly line at Cummins.


Meanwhile, Cohort 2, current year 8s, have begun their application stage. Students have applied to be part of the programme and recently Cummins held an assessment centre and interview process at the school. Students were placed in non-friendship teams and given a task of building a paper bridge capable of carrying 1kg. The intention was for the Cummins engineers to watch for key traits such as teamworking, resilience, problem solving and leadership. Following on from the assessment centre, students were then interviewed by the engineers. This was a great learning experience for all of the students, regardless of whether they were one of the 20 successful candidates who will now be mentored by Cummins staff for the next 4 years. Their first activity starts almost immediately; they will be taking part in the Pinewood Derby activity - students will design and build a Lego car using engineering principles to ensure it travels the fastest along a 17 metre track.

MENTAL HEALTH PEER EDUCATORS

This term Year 12 Mental Health Peer Educators have successfully delivered 4 weeks of Mental Health Awareness lessons to the Year 7 tutor groups. The Year 12 students have worked really hard to get trained up ready to teach and adapt resources to suit their groups. They have collaborated brilliantly together to deliver engaging lessons with enthusiasm and verve. The Year 7 students have even uttered the phrase "Can we have the Year 12 students do all our PSHE lessons?"!

The Year 7 students have engaged very well and have welcomed the Year 12 students into their PSHE lessons. The Year 7 students have taken on board advice about a range of issues surrounding mental health including understanding what mental health is, how our mental health can be affected in both positive and negative ways, understanding how we can recognise our own mental health state and what steps we can take to help us be more resilient. They have also done some work on the types of support available and how they can help each other with mental health.

This is always a popular part of the Year 7 PSHE curriculum and this year has indeed carried on the tradition. I am very proud of the Mental Health Peer Educators and I look forward to seeing their efforts with the Year 8-11 sessions coming up later in the term.

GEOGRAPHERS GET TO WORK!

It's been a busy time for GCSE and A Level Geographers. Sixth-form geographers took part in an engaging field study, following the course of the River Leven from Kildale to Stokesley. The focus of the day was to explore the river's drainage basin and examine its flood defences.

The group walked over 16,000 steps, tackling steep terrain with great determination and enthusiasm. We were fortunate to have good weather, which made the day all the more enjoyable. The students were a credit to themselves, displaying excellent behaviour and a keen interest throughout. This hands-on experience offered valuable insights into the geography of the area, enhancing their understanding of river systems and flood management strategies. In the same week, a group of Year 11 students ventured into Newcastle city centre for a day of discovery and learning. Their mission was to bring their GCSE case studies to life, exploring iconic locations such as Newcastle Great Park, Leazes Park, Chinatown, Ouseburn, and the Quayside. The students looked into how land use has evolved across the city, comparing greenfield and brownfield sites, while uncovering the stories of urban greening and regeneration. These studies were closely linked to Newcastle's journey of opportunities and challenges over time, providing a deeper context to their classroom learning.



All students were fantastic ambassadors for the school, engaging with the fieldwork enthusiastically and thoughtfully. Their efforts have already paid off, as they've been able to apply their new knowledge in their recent mock exams.


UCAS

The UCAS cycle for 2025 applicants is well underway. This year we have had 24 early applicants for courses at Oxford & Cambridge, or applicants to Medicine & Dentistry, a number of which have begun to receive interviews and offers.

In preparation for interview, our Oxbridge students took part in a session on Wednesday 13th November led by Richard Petty from Oxford for North East which was highly informative and gave our students an insight into what to expect at interview. In addition, 8 of our medical/dental applicants have been selected to attend Yarm School's annual Mock MMI Interview Evening on Wednesday 27th November.

All other applicants have until Thursday 28th November to submit their applications on the UCAS portal and hand the appropriate paperwork to their tutors. This will allow the tutors to put together references and carry out final checks in time for the UCAS equal consideration deadline in January. Students who have already submitted forms are receiving offers and interviews, so we encourage students to submit forms ASAP.

MESSAGE FROM CLEVELAND POLICE - VAWG

Tackling domestic abuse (DA) forms a central part of our ongoing work to deal with Violence Against Women and Girls (VAWG).

In the 12 months to September 2024, Cleveland Police recorded 13,191 DA crimes, involving around 8,700 different victims.


Cleveland Police prioritises tackling perpetrators of DA and dealing robustly with them through the criminal justice system and the use of civil orders.

Meanwhile we invest in specialist roles so officers can safeguard, protect and support anyone impacted by DA, while investigating all reports sensitively, professionally and thoroughly.

We also work closely with our excellent local partner agencies to safeguard and protect anyone impacted by DA.
