Top of the bench



Recently we sent a team of budding Chemistry students to Teesside University to participate in the Royal Society of Chemistry's "Top of the Bench" Chemistry competition. This was the regional round of a national competition open to all schools in the North East of England. The teams came from far and wide on a miserable, wet day. The team was made up of Arish N, Teddy P, Isobel S and Niamh S. The first part of the competition was a 30 minute "test" in school which they worked in pairs for. This really tested their collaboration as it was designed to not be able to completed within the time limit! The first part of the Teeside University afternoon was a non-Kahoot Kahoot quiz (IT facilities failed on the day). Working in pairs we lost ground in the first two rounds. However, the second part of the afternoon was much improved, coming 5th out of 21 teams in the "Guess the gas" and the practical laboratory based task. The laboratory task was without doubt the highlight. The students gained experience of a newly refurbished university chemistry teaching lab. They were using precision equipment with accuracy and ease. By the end of the afternoon dare I say that the boys were experts using the micropipette to gain an outstanding set of results. They all enjoyed the afternoon and I was very proud of their accomplishment on the day.

The competition was won by Yarm School (157/270 points), 2nd place Framwellgate School (153/270 points) and an excellent effort by our fellow Trust school Laurence Jackson (152/270 points). Ampleforth and Red House Schools rounded out the top 5. We placed overall 7th on 135/270 points. This reflects a tight competition where the students represented their schools excellently. It was a delight to see so many young people coming together in the spirit of competition and there was an outstanding atmosphere in the room.



Get your weekly groceries for a fraction of the cost.

The Bread and Butter Thing (TBBT) offers high-quality, low-cost food to everyone in Stockton-on-Tees.

For £8.50 you can pick up three bags of food worth roughly £35 including fresh fruit and vegetable, chilled food for the fridge, and cupboard staples like cereal. You can also pay just £5 for an individual bag or £17 for a six bag 'family' deal.

On average, you can expect to save around £25 versus buying the products you receive if you picked them up at a supermarket. The food comes from supermarkets, factories and farms, meaning you can help reduce waste while also reducing your cost of living.

Many support organisations now attend the Bread and Butter Thing collection sessions, providing advice to people using the service. This helps to share important information about things like benefits, housing, employability and health. The Bread and Butter Thing volunteers, as trusted members of the community, can also share this support effectively with you.
